Holy Family Guest House Blessed

The Little Sisters welcomed guests to the *First Friday Mass* on April 6th 2018 with the Order of Malta. Bishop David Zubik celebrated the Mass in the Gloria Chapel prior to blessing the newly renovated "Holy Family Guest House." The five bedroom house is now offered to out-of-town guests visiting family and friends living at the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The Order of Malta organized the renovations of the home, which was originally built in the 1940s as the chaplain's house on the Sisters' property. After some significant water damage from multiple harsh winters, the Sisters decided to move forward with renovations so that guests can be welcomed and stay very close to their loved ones living at the home. With the structural renovations complete, members of the Order of Malta and many friends of the Little Sisters donated funds to furnish the entire house as well.

During the Mass, Bishop Zubik thanked

the Knights and Dames for their loving care of the sick and poor and encouraged them to "keep it up." Beautiful music, provided by conductor Thomas Octave and the Maestri Singers, filled the chapel. Following Mass guests walked to the guest house where the Bishop blessed each room. Attendees were then invited for a reception in the main home's auditorium.

Sister Mary Vincent, Administrator, said, "I truly consider this a miracle, we were able to turn 'The Little House' from a liability into an asset. Prior to my arrival last year the Sisters had contemplated tearing down the structure. We are so blessed that the Order of Malta stepped forward and offered their financial assistance and construction expertise to see this project through to the end. Many thanks to the Order of Malta and to our friends and benefactors who contributed to the renovating, furnishing and decorating of this extension of our hospitality."

After a year of spiritual preparation on May 1st, the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker the patron of the Little Sisters of the Poor, five new members made their promises to serve the Pittsburgh home. Four of them are volunteers and one is a current employee. They joined the exisiting members who were on hand to renew their annual promises at the Mass.

The Association Jeanne Jugan (AJJ) offers Catholic men and women aged 18

years or older the opportunity of sharing in the spirituality of the Little Sisters of the Poor, by participating in their mission of hospitality, and helping to spread the charism of Saint Jeanne Jugan where they live and work. The AJJ is an extension of the Little Sisters' hands and hearts. Some of the activities the AJJ assist with include: serving as lectors and Eucharistic ministers, visiting Residents who are hospitalized, and helping with the meal

service, transporting Sisters to church collections, praying with bed ridden Residents, helping with activities and fund raisers for the home.

Members are retirees, professionals, staff members, and faithful volunteers who wish to share in the spirituality of the Congregation and to participate in the Sisters' mission of hospitality to the needy elderly. Established by the Vatican in 1998, there are now over 2,000 members worldwide and 42 members here in Pittsburgh who participate in the Sisters' apostolate in many ways, each one according to his or her talents, interests and family/professional obligations.

"We are grateful to have a vibrant Association here in Pittsburgh. The AJJ group helps our home in so many ways. It is a privilege to be able to share the spirit of our mission with the laity," said Sister Augustine, Little Sister's moderator.
