Staying Active and Engaged

When St. Jeanne Jugan initially founded the congregation of Little Sisters of the Poor back in 1839 the concept was simple. Jeanne welcomed an elderly woman into her home and began caring for her in a loving and happy way. Over the next few decades this concept spread and soon there were homes throughout France and beyond. Each home imbued

a family spirit that still survives today. During the founding years of the Little Sisters, the Residents often helped in the home as they could—mending clothes, preparing food or tending the outdoor garden. Today this tradition continues but in slightly different ways.

Residents are encouraged to participate in the daily happenings at our home.

For many that means volunteering. There are Residents who are Eucharistic Ministers and distribute communion along with Chaplain Father John to the nursing households prior to daily Mass. Others peel vegetables in the kitchen in preparation for dinner. Some even work in the "Country Store" which is stocked with greeting cards, personal care items and candy for daily purchases.

There are also Residents who help in the offices and are ready to lend a helping hand when called upon. As captured in the photograph to the left—multiple apartment Residents recently heeded a call for help to prepare a large mailing. Proving the old adage that "many hands make light work." Everyone works together just as a family does.

The elderly and those with physical limitations, desire to be useful in some way and have purpose. The Sisters encourage involvement either as a participant in the activities of the home or as a volunteer contributing to the daily happenings on Benton Avenue.
