As we continue to reflect on St. Joseph during this special year dedicated to him, we wanted to share another connection our congregation has to this Fatherly Saint. From an archived book about St. Joseph we found a chapter entitled “Patron of a Happy Death” which begins with the following, “Saint Joseph is justly admitted to be above all, the faithful assistant of the dying; he who had the happiness of dying in the arms of Jesus and Mary’ said Pope Benedict XV in July 1920. Our infirmiry Sisters can prove every day of their lives the truth of this assertion, it is especially at the bed side of the dying that we feel most grateful to our Holy Protector.”

From the early days of the Little Sisters and continuing today, even during this tenuous time of a pandemic, it is the height of this vocation to be with the dying. Some Residents initially move into our independent living apartments active and vivacious, while others

join our family when care is no longer possible in their previous living situation. Whichever way they first arrive, most leave us in a similar fashion.

During a Resident’s final days, the Sisters watch them around the clock—trying to not leave them alone. Accompanying the dying involves prayers, assistance to the families present, and

providing a feeling of comfort for all.

Often these prayers are to St. Joseph, who has time and time again answered our prayers for our home, but also comes to our aid when praying for a peaceful journey to Heaven for our Residents. He, along with the Blessed Mother, provide much comfort for our Residents and their families throughout this precious time.

After retiring in December of 2012, Judy Bendtsen searched for a volunteer opportunity close by. She only had to look beyond the brick wall at the end of her street, which surrounds the Little Sisters property, to find the perfect spot. Right away Judy felt comfortable helping with activities and interacting with Residents.

Today Judy is involved in much more. She escorts Residents to activities, sorts canned goods, participates in exercise class, helps with special events like the Rummage Sale and even helped with family visits in the auditorium during the pandemic. Through all this her favorite part remains getting to know the Residents and hearing their personal history.

Judy teases that the best part about volunteering is the “free lunch” that coincides with the Sisters vow of hospitality, but in reality it is “Seeing the smiling faces of the Residents, Sisters, Staff and other volunteers even with masks on!” Not only does Judy enjoy her time here, she is also an excellent advocate of our mission, encouraging fellow members of the Brighton Heights Citizens Federation and those at the local YMCA to offer their time and talent to help the home. Together Connected

Throughout this pandemic friends from near and far have responded to our needs and we are so grateful for the support. One item that has been so helpful in keeping Residents connected to loved ones and friends are iPads. This summer our home was contacted by an organization called “Together Connected.” They donated two brand new iPads to our home through the help of WTAE's Mike Clark.

A nonprofit organization in Long Island, New York, Together Connected was born after patriarch Tom Costello died in a nursing home from stroke complications in June 2020. His daughter, Suzanne Wagner, and sons, Michael and Joseph, and their mother, Pearl, found it difficult during the pandemic to be with him in person throughout his stays in the hospital and nursing facilities. Tom was isolated and the only way to communicate was through the personal devices of staff members. Following Tom's death, the Costello

family worked together to buy an iPad for the nursing facility where he spent his final days. From there they decided to give iPads to any facility in need, including the Little Sisters.

The iPads are in use in our home connecting Residents to their

MOTHER'S MESSAGE



Dear Friends,

On August 30th we joined Little Sisters throughout the world as we celebrated the Feast of our Mother Foundress, St. Jeanne Jugan.

You may know her story, but if not here is a brief summary. In France on a cold winter's day in 1839, Jeanne encountered an elderly, destitute, blind woman named Anne Chauvin begging on the street. Instead of ignoring her, Jeanne picked Anne up, carried her home to place her in her own bed, caring for her until Anne's death. This act of love led to the founding of the Little Sisters and the establishment of homes for the elderly poor throughout the world, including Pittsburgh in 1872 (150 years in 2022!). St. Jeanne Jugan's message remains the same today as it was in 1839, to serve the elderly poor with dignity, respect, and love.

As we celebrated her feast day, we remembered all our benefactors who give so generously to our mission and help us to continue St. Jeanne's legacy. We are thankful for everyone's concern during this difficult time and know that St. Jeanne Jugan will hear our continued prayers.
